
FOREWORD




Grade One

Festivals Around the World





GRAde Three





If your answer is "YES" to the above questions, then you are qualified to be a SPY!

A successful spy, first of all, has to learn to disguise his/her appearance so that other people cannot recognize them. They may achieve this with the help of accessories and make-up. Small tools like glasses, belts wigs or oversized clothes can be very helpful.






Six Plus

A small group of Sixth Graders attend the 6 Plus class, which is created for students whose final year of English learning in primary school will focus on more challenging and sophisticated topics.

As a small class not unlike tutorials at tertiary level, the learning style is mainly inquiry-based with a wide variety of opportunities for collaborative learning, like group projects, presentations, team-teaching, dramatic performances, and many more.

The modules for Six Plus this year are: Module 1: Literature (the novels "Holes" and Once") Module 2: World Religions Module 3: All About You (exploring genetics)

EPA

English Performing Arts (EPA) offers a wonderful way to learn English as it provides plenty of fun and stimulating language learning experiences.

EPA provides students with an invaluable way of gaining specific skills and disciplines in voice, singing, dance/movement and drama. It focuses on their talent, in addition to teaching them new techniques to enhance their performance. EPA can will also provide you with new skills such as mime and debate. Debates can be an effective method of enabling students to take an active part in their own learning through the preparation and presentation of their own work and that of their peers.

Grades One and Two 2 EPA is integrated with English Language Modules. In Grade Three EPA lessons, some basic performing skills are introduced to the students. In Grades Four, Five and Six, they will have an in-depth study in different skills such as drama, music, voice and dance/movement. Students can learn these four components in one year.

Let's have a look at their different lessons.

Drama

Drama builds confidence. Even the shyest of children take just a few weeks to gently build up their self-esteem. We achieve all our aims. The students enjoy the games so much that there are times when they forget they are doing them in English. As a result, their fluency and confidence improves. Our students experience a range of drama activities through the context of life, traditional and fairy tale stories.

Music/Singing

Music is an easy and fun method to learn and improve in language skills. Through the music videos and lyrics of some well-loved songs, students can improve their English languages skills. Sources of some songs introduced to students include "The Lion King", "The Little Mermaid" and "Mulan". Through these songs, they learne to enunciate, use emotions, exercise phrasing and devise staging.

Voice

In voice, students learn how to use their voice *to* convey artistic expression; not only loud and clear voices are need. They are taught to use natural *voice* by the *use* of singing simple songs and poems.

Dance/Movement

Dance is a natural method for learning and a basic form of cultural expression. Children learn movement patterns as readily as they learn language. In Grades Three and Four, students are taught to be consistent in quality and use their skills to improvise and extend movement ideas on their own and with others. We use different kinds of music to stimulate their minds. They also learn to create movement spontaneously when presented with movement ideas or problems.

Super Typhoon Mangkhut

Typhoon Mangkhut, was a powerful typhoon that struck the island of Luzon on

September 14, 2018. It was the strongest typhoon to strike Luzon since Typhoon Megi in 2010, and the strongest typhoon to make landfall in the Philippines since Typhoon Haiyan in November 2013.

Typhoon Mangkhut was also the strongest typhoon to



strike Hong Kong since Typhoon Ellen in 1983.

Mangkhut impacted Hong Kong and southern China.

On September 14, the Hong Kong Government held a rare cross-department press conference over the preparation for Super Typhoon Mangkhut, to remind Hong Kong citizens to "prepare for the worst".

On September 16, Hong Kong issued the Hurricane Signal No. 10 for 10 hours. This marked only the third time that this warning has been issued for the region since 1999, with the others being with Tayphoon Hato in 2017 and Tayphoon Vicente in 2012.

Since super typhoon Mangkhut hit Hong Kong early Sunday morning, it has caused extensive damage and forcing nearly three million people to be moved to safety. The storm, which is being called the world's strongest of the year, finally weakened as it continued to move inland through Asia.



Grade Three

In Module 3, students enjoyed learning about different types of homes.

Have you ever dreamt about what your perfect house would be like? Do you have an image in your mind of what your dream house is like? Where is it located? What kind of floors does it have? What shape is it in?

A dream house is a creation. After learning about houses and homes, our Grade 3 students use their own process of design to create their dream homes. Their dream homes are in different shapes and sizes, like glass houses, rocket houses, tree houses and mountain houses... etc.



Students were then asked to present their Module 3 Projects. It gave them a chance to explore different kinds of houses from around the world while polishing their research and descriptive writing skills. It also gave them a chance to get feedback on their presenting skills before the end of the school year.





In Writing, students finished their final descriptive writing piece. Besides using simple adjectives, a large number of students were able to use more advanced techniques like similes.

They were also learning to use the 5 senses. It is used to describe a scene or a picture to the readers.

A good piece of descriptive writing can make the writing come alive and engage the readers. Consider the 2 sentences below. Which of the following sentences helps you see the picture in your mind better?

Example:

The turkey tastes good.

The skin of the turkey turns a perfect golden-brown colour. The meat was moist and tender. The scent of the sweet apple stuffing fills the room.

All in all, it was a wonderful and productive year for us, and we think that the Grade 3's will be going into Grade 4 with the skills set they need to continue to succeed in English.

Grade Four

In Module 3, Grade Four have been learning about all sorts of creatures and about mysteries. Weird and fantastic creatures have existed in stories and legends for thousands of years. Some of the most famous myths and legends come from the Ancient Greeks, who wrote fantastical stories about gods, goddesses and monsters to teach children about moral values and also to explain how the Earth came to be.

One of the most famous Greek myths is the story of Cronus, who was an extremely jealous god.

In Greek mythology, Cronus was the Titan of time. The Titans were the gods before the gods, and were the children of heaven (Uranus) and earth (Gaea). In total, there were twelve Titans, two of which were Cronus and Rhea, who were husband and wife. They had five children: Demeter, Zeus, Hestia, Hades and Poseidon.



Years before, Uranus trapped all twelve of his children and his wife deep beneath the Earth, where they caused Gaea much pain and suffering. She was furious, and asked her children to cause harm to Uranus. All of them except the youngest, Cronus, dared to take on their father. Cronus took the scythe and attacked his father, leaving him humiliated in the world of the Greek gods. Cronus' attack forced Uranus to be removed as ruler. After Cronus became ruler, Uranus and Gaia predicted that Cronus would be overthrown by his own son, in the same way that Cronus had done to Uranus. Cronus then took a drastic measure to prevent this.



Despite his wife Rhea's protests, he swallowed each and every one of his own children – except one. Rhea, who was devastated by the loss of her children, hid her youngest son, Zeus, and gave Cronus a rock wrapped up like a baby instead. Cronus swallowed the rock, believing it to be Zeus. Rhea raised Zeus in secret, and Cronus believed that the prophecy would never come true.

When Zeus grew up, he turned against his father. He snuck a drug into Cronus' food, causing him to vomit out all of Zeus' brothers and sisters, and the rock. The siblings went to war against Cronus and the rest of the Titans, and banished the corrupt gods to the underworld, Tartarus. The prophecy was fulfilled.



Grade Five

In Module 3, the students learnt about the Middles Ages, which lasted from about 5th Century to the 15th Century. When people normally think of the Middle Ages, they typically think of the feudal system and Black Death. But there was so much more to this interesting time in history. Here are five interesting facts about the Middle Ages that you may not have known:

1) Pigs could be a real danger



In medieval times, pigs were kept as meat animals but were not necessarily kept contained on farms – wild pigs and domestic pigs could be found foraging in forests, in castle grounds and even in towns. People thus had much more contact with live pigs than we do today – this could be dangerous, and even deadly.

There were multiple accounts of pigs eating children. From the 13th century, killer pigs could be taken to court - this usually resulted in a death sentence for the pig. Such lawsuits were rare in England but were more common in France.

2) The English were multilingual

The medieval English did not only speak English - they used French, Latin and Hebrew, as well as other languages. 3) Not everyone was Christian, or white



There were Jews and Muslims in medieval Europe, and there were also practitioners of other religions, such as Paganism.

Race wasn't defined according to modern terms, so 'white' and 'black' were far less important than one's religion. For example, a black Christian bishop from Africa was considered more civilised

and of far higher rank than a white European peasant. People were more likely to be discriminated against according to religion than skin colour, with Cathars, Jews and known heretics among those who suffered greatly.

4) Gunpowder killed the castle

From 1300, the invention of gunpowder made life difficult for castle engineers. Canon balls were able to smash through walls. Designs changed to cope with the threat, but soon they stopped being built for defence and were instead a way to show off your wealth and importance.

Ocean Park is in Aberdeen on Hong Kong Island. It was opened in 1977. It has many attractions and people can see many interesting animals.


There are many animals in Ocean Park. We can see giant pandas, beautiful dolphins, colourful birds, dangerous sharks and fluffy polar bears.








Title: A Wonderful Birthday Party
