Self-regulated Learning

To enable students to become a self-regulated learner, we have to provide them chances for reflection.

In English, we start doing so by modifying the writing journal. The part of "Looking Ahead" includes setting goals and strategies and the part of "Looking Back" includes reflection and evaluation. The part on "Self-Reflection" is also strengthened by providing students a more detailed check list, a reminder of re-reading the writing and a guide for thinking of improving actions.

By enforcing students' selfediting skills, we hope that they are able to engage in the art of being a reader and understand the audience they are trying to write for; be more critical of their own work; and realize the importance of writing with accuracy.

Let's work hard and become independent and self-regulated learners!


We are looking forward to having a rewarding and fun-filled academic year and will share with you in PEN.


♥ Welcome to Pui Kiu! ♥







Have you heard of any of these mysterious creatures below?




Welcome to Module 1 "Secrets and Spies"!


In this module, students will understand the work of spies, the lives of some famous spies in the world and the characteristics of spies.





In this Module, the students are being introduced to the global issue of discrimination.

Despite living in modern times where everybody should be able to live alongside one another in happiness and equality, many people still face discrimination on a daily basis.

In this module, students will look at real cases of discrimination both from the past as well as the present.







But they will learn that there is still hope too; they'll learn about



the people who rise up to fight against the injustices that discrimination cause. From powerful leaders to a regular businessman,

from famous athletes to an everyday teenage girl; the students will learn that anyone can make a difference and that we should all do our part to make the world a better place for all.





Hello everyone! Do you want students to be totally excited about their education? Well, **English Performing Arts (EPA)** is here to make that happen.

In the EPA lessons, our students gain confidence in speaking English and have fun at the same time.



Let's have a look at some photos and upcoming events. At the beginning of EPA lessons, Grade 1 students are introduced to four main components. They are Drama, Music, Voice and Movement/Dance. Students can learn these four components in one year.

Grade One EPA is an integrated curriculum. It is incorporated into the Grade 1 English curriculum.

G1 students will learn to sing and dance to songs. We will learn "The More We Get Together" and "Let's Clean Up", and we will be learning "the People Song" and "Who Are the People in Your Neighbourhood". We have lots of FUN every year!

We have lessons that compare current music to music from the past, lessons that connect movement and music. There are also lessons about voice and pitch, and lessons that focus on the children's drama skills.

There are plenty of activities to keep our students engaged while building their language and critical thinking skills.

Grade Two EPA builds upon what the students have learned in Grade 1. They carry on having fun whilst learning more about Drama, Music and movement. The students continue to gain confidence in their spoken English.

The three **EPA** modules are linked with the English curriculum. We look at Festivals Around the World, Hong Kong My Home and Exploring the Human Body.



G2 students will learn to sing and dance to songs. They will also learn to play funny characters in short plays. They will sing songs like 'Winter Wonderland', 'Five little Pumpkins' and 'Firework'. It will be amazing!

Later in the year, the students will have the wonderful opportunity to showcase their skills during English Week. They will rehearse a song, dance and script and perform in front of the whole school. This is the highlight of their year!

These are wonderful activities which improve their confidence and English speaking ability.



Grade Three and Four EPA. In Grades 3 and 4, students will have an in-depth and explicit study of four EPA components - Drama, Music, Voice and Dance/Movement – all taught within a year.



In the Drama module, students experience a range of drama activities through the context of everyday life, traditional and fairytale stories.

The Music module introduces students to a wide repertoire of both classic and contemporary songs, of which students learn to improve projection, enunciation, phrasing and basic staging techniques.

In the Voice module, students learn about vocal variety to convey artistic expression to reading aloud and role-playing.

In the Dance/Movement module, students are able to learn choreography improvised movement as well as the use of performance space.



Grade Five EPA. In Grade 5, students get to demonstrate what they have learnt from the previous years by rehearsing and putting on the PKC Annual Grade 5 Performance.

Grade Six EPA. Grade 6 EPA serves as a bridge between the performance skills learnt in primary school and the creative, communicative and collaborative skills needed for secondary school and beyond. The year's curriculum integrates the themes of the modules in English, through which our students will learn devising their own short plays, improvising scenes, engaging in formal debates and performing poetry and monologues.
