First, they formed groups of 4 to 6 classmates.


Second, they chose a country to work on for their project.

The students were really proud of what they did.


I think the audience had a great time with them! The audience could not stop clapping and cheering for their buddies' great acting and singing and dancing.

In Grade 3, students will have an indepth study on the four main components in performing arts. They will learn Drama, Music, Voice and Movement /Dance in one year.

#### Drama

Drama classes are based around stories and poems which appeal to children's interests, whilst helping them develop self-awareness and an understanding of their own abilities. They start from doing simple pantomime individually and then creating different sculptures.

#### Movement/Dance

Through Movement and Dance, students learn to be consistent in quality and try to use skills to improvise their movements. Students will learn some traditional dance, some more modern, and some *they will* create.



#### Voice

In Voice, students learn how to use their voices through rhythm, diction, story-telling and vocal variety when performing different poems and chants. They learn about different forms of presentation and develop their confidence in presenting themselves to an audience.
