

Grade Six Plus

For Module 1 in Six Plus, students have been learning about **LITERARY DEVICES** that can be found in their novels, *Holes* and *Once*. **LITERARY DEVICES** are tools that writers often use to add meaning or create more compelling stories for the reader. Take a look at the literary devices Six Plus have learnt, as well as some examples written by the students themselves!

ALLITERATION

• words that start with the same sound (not just the same letter)

eration

are used repeatedly in a phrase or sentence.

HYPERBOLE

METAPHOR

ONOMATOPOEIA

• a word describes a sound and actually mimics the sound

PERSONIFICATION

• *an idea or thing is given human attributes and/or feelings*

- directly compares two different things
- use "as" or "like"

children. I really liked teaching, which is why in 2010 I decided to train to be an English teacher.








If you see me around the school, please feel free to say "Hi!"






