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
Grade One

Grade Five



Apart from learning from readers, students have also spent time building knowledge through the use of Google documents, Padlet, Pear Deck and Google Slides. For Padlet, for example, students used it to reflect and evaluate what they learnt in Module 1. Google Slides were used for students to work together to review what they learnt grammar-wise in Term 1. Google document was used to allow students to listen to videos, then write their answers to pre-given questions based on the videos. These are some of the ways teachers and students alike are ensuring that effective learning takes place when learning online.

And from over a month of lessons on Zoom, students have become very proficient with using a myriad of online tools for activities, assignments and even assessments.



Besides the different facets of Google Forms and Google Docs, we have made use of Padlet to compile our thoughts using K/W/L charts. After reading up on religions in their reader, students posted what else they would like to learn on the Padlet. Different groups were tasked with researching the answers to these "L" items and gave indepth group presentations to illustrate different religions.



Another popular platform has been Quizziz. The quiz games have been instrumental in our pre-learning, revision and extended learning of different concepts in our module. Either as instructor-paced or student-paced, playing these thrilling challenges always leaves our students striving for success in their learning... and on the leaderboard!





People began racing into space in the 1950s and 1960s. The first person in space was **cosmonaut** Yuri Gagarin, from Russia (then part of the Soviet Union). He **orbited** Earth one time and landed safely after 108 minutes on April 12, 1961. In 1968, U.S. **astronauts** on *Apollo 8* successfully orbited the Moon. On July 20, 1969, the crew of *Apollo 11* stepped onto the Moon's surface.

Space programs created vehicles that let people stay in space for days or weeks. However, scientists

were building a structure in which people could actually live for months or years.

The Soyuz spacecraft, first created in the 1960s, are still being used to take people to and from the International Space Station.



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
